The key areas where MIS is available are as follows</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Student Enrolment and Admission Data: Student profile aligning with the requirements of AISHE, Student on Roll and DHEMIS are generated ensuring accuracy and updated information. Also, student merit list considering the reservations and other mandatory conditions are generated from the system. 2. Results and Examination: Result processing and grading are completely automated using customized conditions based on the grading system instructed by the affiliating body, the University of Mumbai. Results analysis categorized on caste wise, genderwise and grade wise along with topper lists - subject wise and class wise are generated. This helps in reducing the time lag between the date of examination and declaration of final results. 3. Pay Roll Management: The biometric system and RFID systems are interlinked with payroll management. Staff profiles are also maintained within the system. 4. I Card and Library Card Generation: The student enrolment data and faculty profile are interlinked to generate - Identity cards and Library Cards. 5. Integrated Library System: The library data is entirely integrated using SOUL software generating categorical reports of books available and demand supply analysis of books. 6. Financial Management: Planning, Execution, and Monitoring of expenditures and revenues of the institute are based on the FMIS module of MIS. Inventory control is also integrated herewith. Voucher generation is done through this system alone. 7. Student Support Services: Issuance of leaving certificate,

transfer Certificate, Railway certificate, bonafide certificate, etc are again system generated.

Part B

CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

The Institute is affiliated with the University of Mumbai adopts the curriculum designed by the Board of Studies, UoM. As the CBCS was adopted progressively, the IQAC committee made sure faculties are well trained and were therefore enrolled under various syllabus-related workshops. This year it also set up a mechanism wherein trained faculties now mentored the other faculties in wake of revised syllabus and appropriate teaching pedagogies. This ensured that the curriculum so designed reaches to its core. On the basis of the previous year's feedback collected from the stakeholders, the institute to fill in the industrial - academia linkages and fill in curriculum gaps, certificate course were designed and implemented. Feedbacks on the same were collected and analyzed. (WHICH COURSES) As a regular practice, departmental academic planners were placed and consolidated by the IQAC and displayed. The Departmental meetings are conducted wherein workload allocation along with timetable are distributed amongst the faculties. Within a time frame of one week, a structured monthly lesson plans needs to be submitted to the departmental heads who ultimately forward the same to the IQAC coordinator. The lesson plans not only include syllabus structurization but also provide information regarding the conduct of class tests and quick references. The subjects which involve project work, specify the details of the projects to be undertaken. A syllabus completion report needs to be submitted before the term end, this helps to establish the fact no syllabus is omitted and meets the set standards. Student orientation programs are conducted for each class to make them aware of course outcomes and acquaint them with the syllabus and evaluation patterns well in advance with tentative schedules of examination. Question banks and practice sets are maintained in the library for student's reference. To provide a comprehensive overview of the syllabus, faculties corroborate it with innovative teaching methods such as field visits, peer-peer learning, flip classrooms, and ICT tools. Guest lectures were organized for students by inviting experts and Members of the syllabus framing committees. Courses where no internal exams were to be conducted, practice tests were taken by the faculties to prepare students well for the term-end examination. Result analysis conducted by the examination committee was shared with the IQAC committee who then framed and structured the conduct of remedial lectures for ATKT students and slow learners to ensure translation of curriculum. As a practice curriculum, based feedbacks were collected and analyzed leaving no stones unturned in the effective delivery of the curriculum. Infrastructural facilities were upgraded with Infilbnet services were made available to the faculties for their knowledge enrichment and translations. (BRAILLE SOFTWARE?)

Feedback Obtained
<p>Apt feedback ensures effective implementation of curriculum beneficial both to the student fraternity and society at large. To cater to this, the IQAC committee has evolved an analytical feedback mechanism with improvements each year to meet the ever-changing industrial needs. Based on previous years feedbacks it was observed that percentage of students providing feedback was low. This year to ensure the maximum number of students participate with no fear, feedbacks were collected from students class wise however care was taken their identity is not disclosed and hence form was distributed by the guardian teacher but was collected using a ballot box. The feedback is collected through a semi-structured questionnaire designed on 5 Likert scale and open-ended questions related to the curricular aspects. Informal feedback from parents, students, and alumni continues to remain an integral part of the mechanism. In the case of teachers, the feedback too is collected offline in the departmental meetings and staff colloquium meetings conducted half-yearly. The faculties here identify the gaps in the existing syllabi and put forth their suggestions and is taken forward by the hierarchal set up. Since the syllabus had undergone a change by the affiliating body, the suggestions were forwarded to the syllabus framing committees and board of studies. Need-based certificate course designing based on feedbacks remained in practice. This helped to bridge the industry academia linkages. The feedback so collected is displayed along with the action taken report on the college website for the next 6 months. Alumni Speaks were also displayed on the website. Efforts were made to collect feedback from employers while designing certificate courses and curriculum gaps.</p>

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2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

The university of Mumbai enforced credit based semester grading system (CBSGS) from the academic year 2010-11. It was made choice based so that the learners can select courses (Subjects) of their choice. In this connection it is worthwhile to state that this is perhaps the only college which offers 36 subject combinations at the F.Y.B.A. Level and 72 subject combinations at the S.Y.B.A. Level. Both Computer Science and biotechnology syllabus were restructured to suffice to the needs of manpower for the growing industry in the corresponding fields. For all courses of the self-financed programmers viz. B.M.S., B.A.F., B.Sc. Computer Science, B.SC.-Biotech, B.Sc.-I.T. and the Foundation Course of the traditional programmes at the undergraduate Levels there are 75 marks theory papers. (External Component) along with internal component of 25 marks. The Learners are required to qualify both components separately and as a whole in order to be successful. For the internal components of foundation course, project work on different topics is assigned to the learners by the concerned Professors. The project reports are evaluated by a team of Professors who not only assess the reports but also give useful suggestion to the Learners for further progress. In this institution we have several students who commute to the college every day from remote and mofussil areas They have to travel long distances, on foot, by Bus, Train, Autorikshaw, and Ferryboat and so on for acquiring higher education. Such students may remain absent for internal evaluation not for their fault but for other reasons including heavy rainfall and floods which are prevalent in this region. At the institutional level we display and announce the names of the learners who have remained absent for the internal evaluation and thereby instruct them to meet the respective Professors for completing the project work to the satisfaction of the Professor. We have also introduced coding system for the answer sheets of the theory examinations to be assessed by the faculty members who have to assess the papers in a centralized assessment programme, so that the identity of the student is not disclosed. This is in order to prohibit any kind of malpractice such as favoritism or victimization to the students.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

Every year the college reopens in the first or second week of June. The annual academic calendar is prepared prior to commencement of the first term and is displayed on the very first day of the term for information of students. The examinations at the undergraduate level are conducted twice a year in the semester pattern on behalf of the university. First third semester examination of regular repeater students and second and fourth semester examinations of

repeater students are conducted in October-November. These are called second half examinations whereas the second and fourth semester examinations of regular (repeater) students and the first and third semester examinations of repeater students are conducted in March-April, every year. These are called the First half examinations on the basis of calendar year. The actual timetable of the examinations is uploaded by the university, one month prior to commencement of the examinations. Therefore the corresponding months are mentioned in the academic plan for conduction of the examination. The question papers for conduction of the examination are sent by the university to the college by digital electronic paper delivery system (DEPDS). The question papers are uploaded about one hour before the scheduled time of the paper. The I.T. co-ordinator of the college holds the prime responsibility of downloading the question papers which are then Xerox-copied in the required quantity. The Xerox copies are packed in sealed envelopes and are sent to the respective blocks. Seating arrangement with only one student on every bench is displayed twenty minutes before the scheduled time of the paper. Facilities of verification of the marks, providing Xerox copies of assessed answer-books and revaluation are made available to the students.

Quality Circles form an integral part of the management ecosystem in the institution. Apart from the regulatory roles of the various administrative heads, staff colloquium meetings are held and every member secretary of the committee places its needs and proposal as part of perspective planning. This helps to incorporate the opinions of all and lead to democratic management. In case of decisions of new course application, infrastructure development and other developments involving a budget of Rs 3,00,000 or more the LMC/CDC and IQAC works in close consultation while in case of smaller amounts Principal acts as liaison between the committees and departmental heads. This helps to reduce the glitches of delay decision making and everyone has its say in the management. This year to ensure the vision statements of the institution are well communicated and put into practice, a Centre for Excellence and Innovations was formed to ensure quality education. The decision making system can be described wherein Vice Principal and IQAC co-ordinator who are second-in-command are shouldered with the responsibility to implement decisions by coordinating academic, administrative, co-curricular, extra-curricular, extension activities and other activities. Further Co-ordinators are appointed for various course who work in close consultation with the administration activities such as admissions, student enrolment, parent - student co-ordination etc. Again Departmental heads are appointed for inclusiveness. Departments have freedom in matters such as Syllabus Distribution, Academic Planning, designing and running of add-on courses, implementing remedial programmes. Flexibility in internal evaluation schedule and evaluation pattern. Examination and Evaluation

The institution, being affiliated to the UoM, has to follow the examination and evaluation system devised by the system. Examination being conducted for all the years by the University, the committee takes care the system is implemented effectively with dedicated examination room backed by UPS and Dongle facilities in case of power failures. The exam committee organizes training programme for Junior Supervisors to ensure rigor and transparency in the examinations. Teaching and Learning

Academic calendar is prepared keeping in mind all the curricular aspects. For execution of planning , Teaching Dairy is being maintained by every faculty member. The teaching dairy includes

following things - Teaching Plan, Time Table, Daily Teaching Report, Duty Leave / Casual Leave / Medical Leave records. Teaching dairy is submitted to Vice-Principal at the end of every semester. At the end of the each semester Departmental review meetings are arranged in case of syllabus completion on the time. As per the need of the department, remedial course and sessions are organized. Question banks are also provided to the students. ICT tools are incorporated wherever required.

Curriculum Development

The institute being affiliated to the University of Mumbai, adopts the curriculum designed by the body, but the effective implementation is carried by the IQAC and Departmental heads. Curriculum based workshops are organized for the faculties in the beginning of the academic year through faculty exchange programs under MoU's and at same time workshops are organized at student level prior to the examination.
